Roger L. Martínez-Dávila Biography

Roger is an Associate Professor of History at the University of Colorado-Colorado Springs and he serves as the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Fellow for the Graduate School. He holds a Ph.D. in medieval European history from the University of Texas at Austin and earned a Master of Public Policy from the University of California-Berkeley. He is author of Creating Conversos: The Carvajal-Santa María Family in Early Modern Spain (2018) and co-curator and co-author of the 2016 museum exhibition and catalogue, Fractured Faiths: Spanish Judaism, the Inquisition, and New World *Identities*. From 2015 to 2018, he served as a European Commission Marie Curie Fellow at the Universidad de Carlos III de Madrid where he initiated his Deciphering Secrets project -- a global research, educational, and citizen science endeavor. It employed Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) to teach medieval Spanish history as well as trained over 40,000 students in 140 nations to perform original transcription of medieval manuscripts pertaining to Jewish, Christian, and Muslim interrelations. His latest scholarship centers on the digital humanities and he was coawarded a 2021-2023 National Endowment for the Humanities grant to implement the Immersive Global Middle Ages Advanced Digital Humanities Institute.
