Diane Sieber directs the Herbst Program of Engineering, Ethics and Society in the College of Engineering at the University of Colorado Boulder. She has served as Associate Dean for Education in the College of Engineering, as Director and Faculty in Residence of the Global Engineering Residential Academic Program, and she Co-Directed the ATLAS (Alliance for Technology, Learning and Society) Institute from 2000-2007. Professor Sieber is a President's Teaching Scholar and a Carnegie Teaching Scholar.

Dr. Sieber's research areas include two eras of technology-driven communication revolution: Renaissance Europe immediately post printing press, and the current networked digital age. She has published on *Don Quixote*, the Moriscos in the early modern Mediterranean, Spanish Golden Age drama, poetry and historiography, and cartographic writing in Spanish Colonial New Mexico. She has also published on teaching and learning with emerging technologies in higher education. Recent work includes studies of learning through online social networks, cognition and learning in game worlds, and the role of games in the education of princes in early modern Europe. She is currently on sabbatical, completing the monograph *Morisca Voices*, an examination of Morisca appeals of the expulsion decree of 1609 (Archivo General de Simancas, CC, 1609-1614.)

She received her M.A. and Ph.D. in Romance Languages and Literatures from Princeton University, and was an assistant professor and associate professor in the CU Boulder Department of Spanish and Portuguese prior to joining the Engineering faculty.
